Loses Brother, Another Hurt In Car Crash At Finch

Mrs. John C. Gauthier, Alexandria, will have the sympathy of many friends in the accidental death of one brother and injury of another, last night, in a traffic accident at Finch.

Dead is Dennis McMahon, 82, instantly killed at 8:30 last night when the car driven by his brother, James McMahon, 70, ran into the rear of a parked truck on Highway 43 at the west end of Finch.

James is in Winchester Memorial Hospital with a fractured jaw and facial lacerations. His condition is reported satisfactory.

According to reports, the two brothers, who live on separate farms one mile west of Finch, were driving into the village when their car rammed the parked three-ton truck owned by Rideau Honey Farm of Kemptonville. The driver is Russell Rist of Finch.

Surviving Dennis McMahon are his wife, the former Theresa Rady, three sons and four daughters.

The funeral will be held on Saturday at 9:30 o'clock from the Brownlee Funeral Home, Finch, to St. Bernard's Church and cemetery.

Provincial Convention Of Isabellas Successful Weekend Event

"Membership in the Daughters of Isabella is one of the best means available to Catholic Women for signal service to God", Miss Julia F. Maguire told members of the group at their provincial convention banquet held Saturday night in Green Valley Pavilion.

International regent of 117,000 members, of whom 100,000 are in the United States and the Philippines, Miss Maguire told members that the organization was founded by a group of zealous American women who realized the need of lay leaders to take the positive approach to the problems of our time. Isabella, Queen of Spain, was chosen as the great lay model.

One of the greatest achievements of the organization has been the support of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine, through which home study courses have been sent to members of the armed services and, more recently, to any person seeking information. "In this way we are outdoing communism, because through the courses we spread truth", Miss Maguire quoted a navy chaplain.

Another outstanding work is the education of young men for the priesthood and the financial support to the Society of the Propagation of the Faith to train missionaries in their native lands. Just last spring, nine priests were ordained through this support.

The "Via Coeli" movement was explained as one in which members pray for priests no longer able to render active service.

Introduced by Mrs. Johanna Broderick of Niagara Falls, provincial vice-regent, the regent was thanked by Mrs. Clare Merchant, Sturgeon Falls, provincial treasurer.

In his welcoming address, Rev. Rosario Brodeur, Bishop of Alexandria, stressed the need for an apostleship to bring the world to its senses. "People have lost their sense of responsibility and feel that 'getting away with it' condones all wrong-doing", he stated. "You cannot become an apostle by wishing."

Mrs. Lillian Fitzgerald, Toronto, provincial regent of 1700 members in Ontario, told members their attitude was all important in dealing with their problems and advised

that a smile was the best instrument for winning souls.

Greetings were extended the delegates from the Town of Alexandria by His Worship Mayor Simon; from Glengarry - Prescott, by Osie Villeneuve, M.P., and Fernand Guindon, M.P.P., from the Knights of Columbus, by Laurier Lefebvre, Faithful Navigator of Bishop Macdonell Assembly, and Gabriel Aubry, Grand Knight. Welcome to the National Regent was extended from the Provincial Council by Mrs. Cécile Latéigne, Kapuskasing, and by the Provincial Chaplain, Rev. John Beahan, C.J.D., of South March, Ont.

Gifts were presented to Miss Maguire, Mrs. Fitzgerald and to the local regent, Mrs. Laurier Lefebvre, who presided at the banquet.

Following eight o'clock Mass Sunday morning at Sacred Heart Church, Rev. John Beahan was guest speaker at the communion breakfast held in Green Valley Pavilion. "In your lay apostolate, follow the example of the apostles, who were themselves weak, but who persevered through the guidance of the Holy Ghost", he advised.

A tour of the town's churches, convents and schools followed, with the group returning to Alexander Hall at 2 p.m. for a panel discussion on the theme, "The Catholic Woman as a Modern Apostle". Miss Evelyn Bennett, provincial secretary, acted as moderator, with participants Mrs. Elizabeth Lococo, Niagara Falls; Mrs. Ubald Poirier, Alexandria, and Miss Jeanne de Montigny of Kapuskasing.

A buffet luncheon served in Alexander Hall was enjoyed by over two hundred guests in the evening and was followed by the installation of officers. Mrs. Laurier Lefebvre was elected a provincial trustee, along with Mrs. Ubald Poirier, who was re-elected for another term.

Among the highlights on the local Circle's report was: the contribution of \$150 yearly towards the support of a seminarian in the foreign missions; a \$50 scholarship awarded to a local boy attending Cornwall Classical College; \$250 worth of school uniforms contributed to local schools, as well as numerous other works of charity.

Sandy McDougall Dies At 88

A widely known resident of the Alexandria area through most of his long life, Alexander A. (Sandy) McDougall died Sunday, October 11th, in Macdonell Memorial Hospital, Cornwall. His death came one day following his 88th birthday and after six weeks of hospital treatment.

Mr. McDougall had resided for the past seven years with his sisters, Mrs. Mary McDonald and Mrs. Bella McGillis, at St. Raphael. Word of his passing was received with regret by many friends throughout this area.

A son of A. R. McDougall and his wife, Sara McDougall, he was born at Harrison, Mich., October 10th, 1871, the family returning to the Alexandria area while he was yet a child. He farmed at Lot 20-1st Lochiel until moving to St. Raphael following the death of his wife, the former Hannah Mundy, June 27th, 1952.

Three sisters survive, Mrs. Joseph McDonald (Kate) of Montrose, Col.; Mrs. Mary McDonald and Mrs. Bella McGillis, St. Raphael; as well as two nephews and two nieces: Ronald McDonald, Martinez, Cal.; John McDonald, Montrose, Col.; Mrs. Jack Cameron of Kirkland Lake, and Mrs. Les McAbee, in Denver, Col.

The body rested at the Marcoux & Morris Funeral Home until Wed-

nesday when the largely attended funeral was held at St. Fintin's Cathedral and cemetery. The Solemn Mass of Requiem was chanted by Rev. John D. McPhail, rector, assisted by Rev. D. A. Kerr and Rev. Leo MacDonnell. Present in the Sanctuary were Rt. Rev. Msgr. Ewen J. Macdonald, D.P., V.G., and Rev. C. F. Gauthier.

Murder Trial Opened Yesterday

The murder trial of Lucien (Snider) Laparle, 28, of Alexandria, opened yesterday at Cornwall when he was arraigned before Mr. Justice Thompson of the Ontario Supreme Court on a charge of murdering his son, Joseph Alain Lucien Casquette. Laparle pleaded 'not guilty'.

Dr. M. Markson, Alexandria, and Dr. W. J. Shannon, Cornwall pathologist, gave evidence before the Grand Jury Tuesday, following which a true bill was brought in on the murder count.

Mrs. Theresa Casquette, common-law wife of Laparle, was on the witness stand yesterday and others expected to give evidence today are Police Chief Ed Dupuis, Dr. Markson and Dan Proulx, a neighbor.

Charge against Laparle was laid April 16th after discovery of the dead body of the Casquette baby in a bedroom of the house in which Laparle lived with his father and common-law wife.

No New Cases Of Polio Reported

No new cases of polio have been reported by the Counties Health Unit over the past five days and officials believe advent of colder weather may mean an end of the outbreak in the Cornwall area.

The last two cases reported occurred in Newington area, where two small children were stricken by paralytic polio and taken to Ottawa Civic Hospital. Both were children of Mrs. May Bilmer, who now has five children in OCH.

The total for the United Counties and the City of Cornwall now stands at 49 cases with four deaths. Of the 49 cases, 20 were reported from the city.

Dr. Morris Resnick, polio specialist at Ottawa Civic Hospital, said Wednesday that all cases from this area undergoing treatment at the hospital were progressing satisfactorily, with "nothing new to report".

A start on pouring concrete will be made next week on the new municipal garage being erected at North Lancaster by the Township of Lancaster. The cement-block building will be a three-bay garage measuring 62x44 feet.

Plaque To Ralph Connor Unveiled In Presence Of 250

The memory of Ralph Connor is still treasured in Glengarry, especially in his native St. Elmo, as was shown last Saturday when some 250 turned out to witness the unveiling of a historical plaque at Gordon Church.

It commemorates the birthplace of Rev. Charles William Gordon, Ralph Connor, whose literary works brought fame to this native son of Indian Lands, Glengarry, and immortalized the brick church erected there in 1864 during the ministry and under the able guidance of his father, Rev. Daniel Gordon.

J. King Gordon, of New York City, a son of Rev. Charles W. Gordon, was present to unveil the plaque. Miss Lois Gordon of Toronto, a daughter, was also in attendance, as was Charles W. Gordon, a student at Queen's University and son of King Gordon.

The program was under the sponsorship of the Glengarry Historical Society, whose president, Hugh P. MacMillan, Lochiel, acted as chairman.

Rev. Iver D. MacIver, of Maxville and St. Elmo Presbyterian Churches, was the principal speaker and he paid high tribute to the life and works of the noted author, preacher and World War I chaplain. Recalling the arrival and ministry of Daniel Gordon, a Highlander who came to Canada as a Presbyterian minister in the 1840s, he noted Charles W. Gordon, his son, would be in his 100th year if still alive. He was born in this

county September 13th, 1860.

Memories of the Gordon family have still persisted here, he noted, though it is nearly 70 years since they left the area. Rev. Daniel Gordon's preaching and teaching were alike memorable and his son must have stored up memories that allowed him to write the wonderfully real stories of Glengarry that did more than anything else to make the county known across the land, Mr. MacIver said.

In his remarks prior to the unveiling, J. King Gordon, son of Ralph Connor, remarked that it always amazed the family that memories of his father kept of this county made a profound impression upon him, although he left it while still a boy and seldom visited the spot again. But the wealth of incidents and realism in the novels about Glengarry were certainly taken from life.

Others who spoke briefly were: Osie F. Villeneuve, M.P.; Fern Guindon, M.P.P.; United Counties Warden Stanley Fraser, and Professor George Stanley of Kingston, a director of the Archaeological and Historical Sites Board responsible for erecting the plaque.

Rev. Donald C. Munro, of Maxville, gave the dedicatory prayer, and Piper Bobbie MacCrimmon played a lament and also provided pipe music for Highland dancing by Sheryl MacGregor and Lois Colbran in the church hall, where the ladies of St. Elmo congregation served afternoon tea.

IT'S OUR OPINION

Better See Your Doctor

THAT was a fairly respectable number of town and area residents, some 1650, who turned out for their first shot of anti-polio Salk vaccine at Wednesday's adult clinic. But we thought there would be many more, anxious to take advantage of the protection the vaccine has proved to be against a crippling killer that very nearly reached epidemic stage this fall in sections of Glengarry.

We thought every thinking adult would long ago have riddled him or herself of the comforting thought that "it cannot happen to me". This in face of the fact that three members of one family, including the mother, have died of the disease; that an entire family connection has been quarantined since ten of them have fallen prey to polio.

What has struck so devastatingly at the Bilmer family of Northfield and district could very easily happen tomorrow, or a year hence, to any family. It seems polio has become even more a hazard since the Salk vaccine gave immunity to the school-age members of the family. They are safe, but apparently they can be innocent carriers, bringing the dangerous germs home to wreak havoc among adults and pre-school brothers and sisters.

The only insurance against polio, it would seem, is for every member of the household, no matter their youth or longevity, to get that series of three needles.

No doubt many area adults had received them from their family doctors long before last week's free clinic was held. Others may be awaiting the holding of such clinics in their own areas. Several are already scheduled.

But if you are the complacent type who shrugs off such threats with the notion that "it can't happen to me", we would urge you to make certain: Your family doctor will serve up the Salk vaccine at a nominal charge, relieving you of at least one worry.

Smallpox, diphtheria, whooping cough, are only a few of the diseases medical science has rendered impotent. Polio may also become but a bad memory if all of us avail ourselves of the protection the Salk vaccine apparently offers.

Those who still shrug it off, we would say, already are suffering from paralysis of the brain.

Should A \$35 Car Be On The Road?

THERE may be food for thought in an item we carried last week; that story of a young man who stole a horse, sold it at an area auction for \$76, and with part of the proceeds purchased a car.

The story was newsworthy if only for the fact that that youngster might have bought two cars for the price of one horse; he paid only \$35 for the jalopy. But the point we are pondering is the ease with which anyone of anything but very tender years is permitted to take to the highways.

If he has a car — if he can get his hands on as much as \$35, that can be sufficient to procure one, it seems — and if he can qualify for a driving permit, the Queen's highways are his. He can join the Sunday stream of traffic as long as he has money for gas, he can lord it over his pals, play the bigshot for the gals, add his tire screeching to those of the other modern-day cowboys.

Perhaps we oldsters are making it too easy for the younger element to add to the traffic hazard. A question suggests itself — is a car a car when it can be bought for \$35, or even \$100? And is the type of person who drives a \$35 car liable to carry liability insurance?

The jalopy that goes at \$35 is probably not too mechanically sound; the driver

could lack a sense of responsibility. And yet he has the same rights to the roads as the solid citizen whose entire family could conceivably be wiped out because he was meeting the wrong car at the wrong instant.

Is it time for a re-appraisal of this entire system of issuing driving permits, especially to the young?

We have not quite reached the living standard of two cars in every garage. But most farmers striving to keep their teenage sons on the home place must provide the 17-year-old with his own crate. As one area farmer puts it, "what are you going to do when the neighbor's kid has his own car, and all the other young fellows along the concession?" If Johnnie is not allowed his own car he can always head for the city, where the problem is only that of not getting nabbed by the police when you have "borrowed" another's car for a joyride.

It was this same farmer who suggested to us there would be no such problem if kids below the age of 21 were not allowed to own a car. If Joe had no jalopy with which to impress the girls, Johnny would not want one so intensely, was his reasoning.

That could be a partial solution to our traffic problem. Certainly, too many youngsters are being allowed behind the wheels of too many \$35 cars.

Our Readership Keeps Growing

TODAY, October 15th, marks the opening of another of those "weeks" that newspapers are continually being asked to promote. This one is of more than usual moment to us, though, for it is National Weekly Newspaper Week, the time of year when the weeklies are urged to be a bit selfish in selling their own product rather than in promoting other more or less worthy causes and institutions.

We are always rather hesitant about promoting National Weekly Newspaper Week because of the fact we have argued more than once in these columns against this plethora of special "days" and "weeks", and "months" the public relations people have foisted upon the people's credulity.

Last week, for instance, was Fire Prevention Week, a very worthy cause, well-timed as a reminder to home-owners that winter brings its special fire hazards. But it was also National Cat Week, and our wastepaper basket bulged with discarded dissertations on what we the people should do to make our felines feel more at home.

That's the thing about all these "weeks" we now know. Some of them are so ridiculous they tend to put in bad odor, causes that are worthy of emphasis.

The newspaperman in our make-up is so conscious, however, of the value of publicity, that we are impelled to remind you that this is the weeklies' special week. This is the one time of the year when we do a bit of promoting of our paper, openly, without equivocation, without even an apology.

Our ammunition is ready-made. Only last week we checked our circulation figures for the last six months and found our average paid circulation had risen to another new high, to 2892. Entirely without promotion we had gained 119 paying readers since last March; and that is a six-months' average. The weekly sales keep rising and a spot check, today, might show more than 3,000 paid circulation.

That is an unusually high total for a weekly paper printed in a country town

with a population of 2500. Many papers in a town this size do well to find 1500 paying customers.

We are not emphasizing our steady growth in circulation in a boastful mood. This is where our promotion of Canadian Weekly Newspaper Week enters into the picture.

We are endeavoring to put across, to businessmen of town and district that they are losing potential business if they are not regular advertisers in this paper. Those who never advertise, as a matter of policy, have probably long ago relegated themselves to the task of making ends meet.

It is to those who still have hopes of expanding their business we point these paragraphs; those possibly who are addicted to throw-away sheets, to radio advertising or gimmick promotions.

Based on our audited circulation statement, this paper is read by an estimated 7,500 people, most of them Glengarry residents, all of them interested in Glengarry. That estimate is probably very low, based on an average two and one-half readers per copy paid for. They read only local news in a paper that seldom has sufficient advertising to warrant more than ten pages. And they read the ads (check with the man who regularly advertises, or ask our readers).

The merchant who would blanket Glengarry with throw-aways is paying much more in postage than a full-page advertisement in this paper would cost him. There is the cost of printing, the readability of the throw-away as compared with an ad in a newspaper that has proven advertising results. An advertisement in this paper, we maintain, is a better buy than mail-clogging throw-aways or air space that suffers from lack of time to digest the merchant's message.

And having said all this, we apologize to those who read our editorial columns in search of less selfish thoughts. Our only excuse is that this is our "week" for promotion.

WE LEARN OF ST. ELMO

Sir: Your article on Ralph Connor (October 1st) was very interesting, but I think not very accurate. I doubt very much that Rev. Daniel Gordon ever preached in the old Congregational Church at St. Elmo or any other Congregational church.

Rev. Gordon preached in the White Church, which was situated in the cemetery at Maxville, and was a branch of the Presbyterian Church in Martintown, when first built in 1826.

When the Gordon Free Church was built at St. Elmo, the old Congregational Church had been founded forty years before, and stood on land which was surrounded by the Glebe of the Gordon Church. This made its geographic position rather confusing, and to compound the confusion, the Congregational manse (where Sir Edward Peacock was born) was behind the Gordon Church, on the farm now owned by Mr. Ralph MacIntosh. The Presbyterian manse was closer to the Congregational church than to the Gordon Church, so I suppose anyone but a native of St. Elmo could be excused for getting mixed up on this story.

I think you will find that some trouble crept into the White Church after the disruption in Scotland, and Rev. Daniel Gordon with his 'Free' followers built the brick church at St. Elmo, where he preached.

TWENTY YEARS AGO

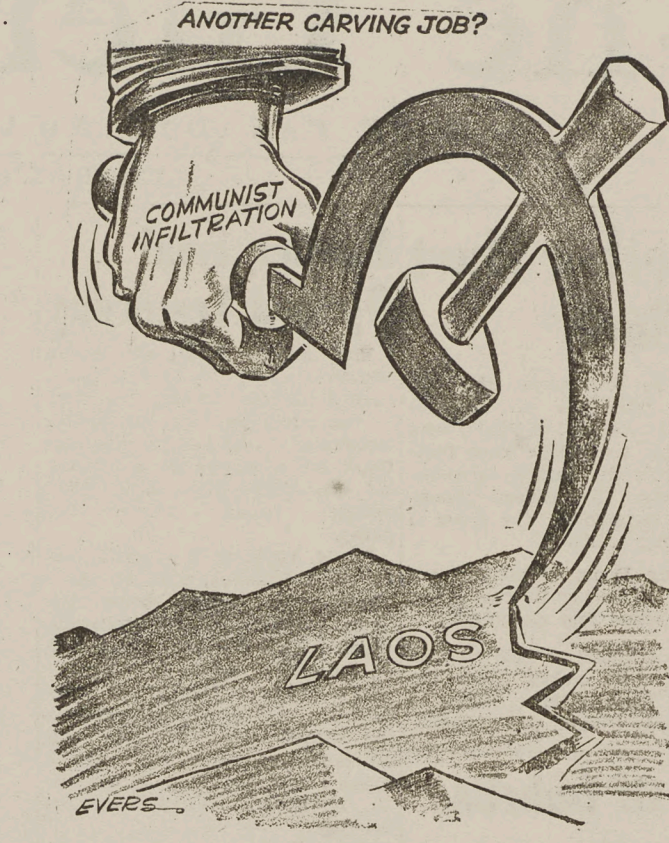
Friday, October 13th, 1939—

The entire situation already promises to provide no John A. MacDonalds and Winston Churchills in the younger generation.

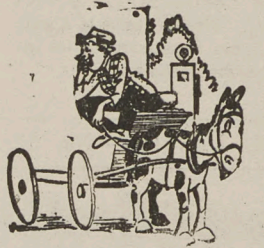
Public Still Important

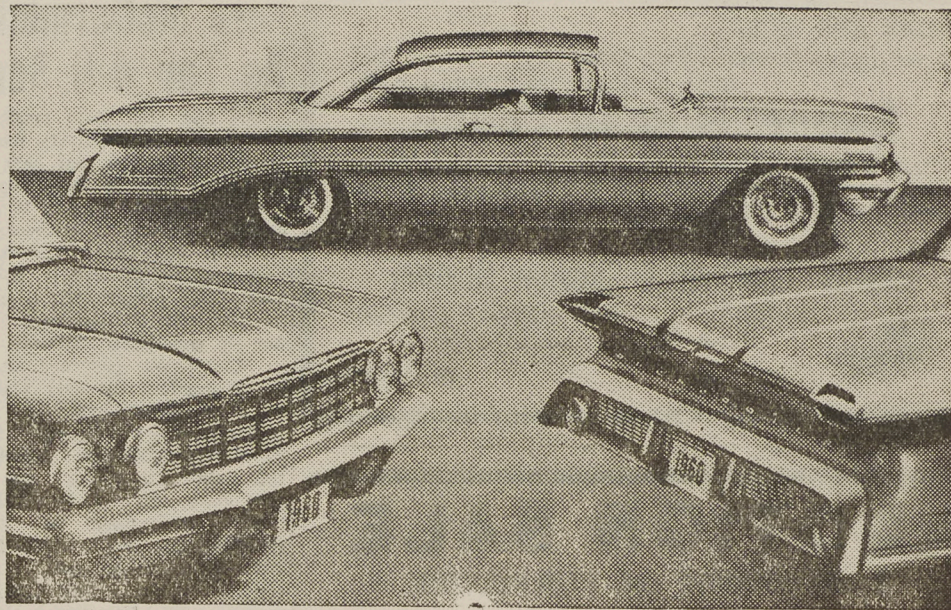

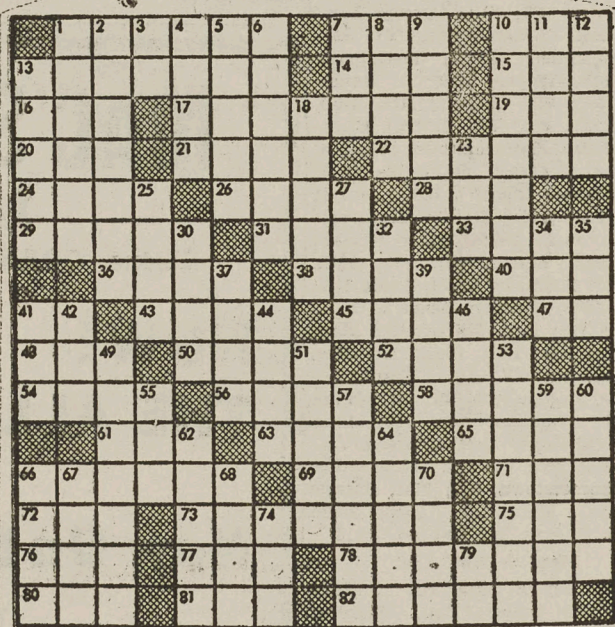

Lera McCormick Wins Prizes As Top 4-H Scorer In County

The 4-H Calf Club program in the County of Glengarry has been completed for the year 1959. This project is open to farm boys and girls between the ages of 12 and 21 and is designed to encourage the adoption of better livestock programs within the county, and provide young people with a training in livestock management. Each boy or girl must nominate a calf in May which they feed and care for throughout the year and show on their Achievement Day which, in the County of Glengarry, is held at Williamstown Fair. Meetings of the club members are held throughout the year at which they receive instruction in judging, showmanship, dairy cattle feeding and pasture management. At the end of the year their project is scored on the following basis:

400 points for award on calf at the Club Fair or Achievement Day, 300 points for judging competition, answers to questions and showmanship:

- 100 points for judging competition.
- 100 points for answers to ten questions based on club work and feeding and management of dairy or beef cattle.
- 100 points for showmanship—manner in which the Club member shows his entry in the ring (70 points); condition of the animal (20 points); general appearance of the exhibitor (10 points).

300 points for Junior Stockmen's Award:

- 100 points for care and feeding methods noted at time of periodic visits made during the season.
- 100 points for regularity and accuracy in forwarding monthly reports.
- 100 points for attendance and interest shown at meetings and judging classes.

Miss Lera McCormick, RR 1, Alexandria, a member of the Lochiel Junior Calf Club and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Michael McCormick, was this year the recipient of two special prizes offered in the county. Lera won the Ottawa Citizen award offered to the boy or girl with the highest score on his or her own work throughout the year, with a total of 528 points out of a possible 600. Lera will receive a purebred Holstein heifer calf offered by the Ottawa Citizen. She also had the highest total aggregate points in the county with 912 out of a possible 1,000.

Lera is also the winner of a true type model Holstein cow offered by Fern Guindon, M.P.P. for Glengarry-Prescott.

David Murray of Martintown, a member of the Williamstown Ayrshire and Beef Calf Club, is the winner of the all-expense paid trip to the Royal Winter Fair, offered

by the Quaker Oats Company of Canada.

Douglas McDonell, Williamstown, a member of the Williamstown Ayrshire and Beef Calf Club, is the winner of the Lions Club of Alexandria trophy awarded to the Grand Champion Showman in the county.

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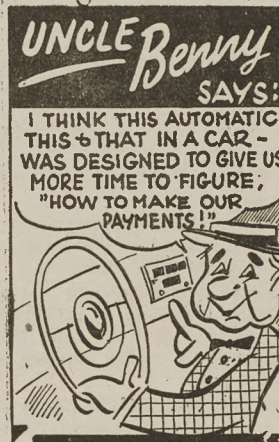

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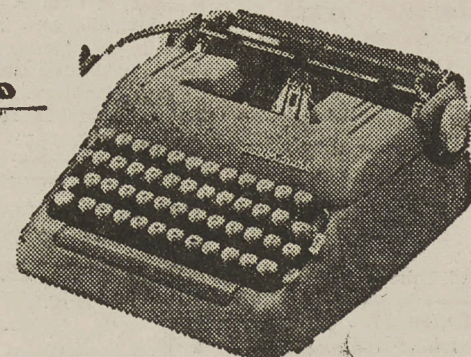

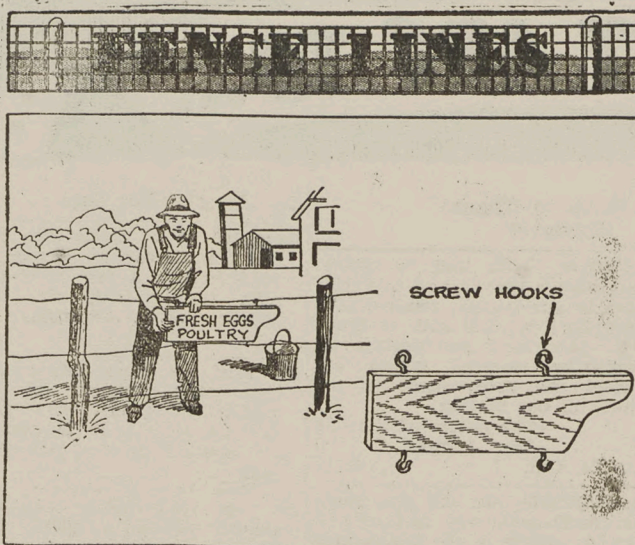
